

What to know about the curriculum:

- The ASCC Curriculum is called **Understanding Infant Adoption, or UIA**. While UIA has been around for many years, the newest version (UIA 7) has been freshly updated with current research, modern examples, and the newest resources.
- Until now, UIA has only been available for live, in-person training. The ASCC project team has worked diligently to create an interactive, engaging, asynchronous training that can be taken online in order to better meet the needs of busy hospital-based staff and social workers.

Birth Parent Experiences

A 2023 report from NCFA, BraveLove, and the Opt Institute surveyed more than 1,000 birth parents to learn about their experiences. According to the report, two of the top predictors of satisfaction with their decision to place their child for adoption were **receiving accurate information** and **non-coercive decision-making**.

[Accurate and Appropriate Adoption Language](#)

One of the top pieces of feedback we heard from medical professionals was that they were unsure how to talk about adoption. As part of the Module 3 focus on presenting adoption as an option and making referrals, participants will be asked to consider outdated, harmful, and inappropriate adoption language and learn terms and phrases to use instead.
